Separate Public Service agencies What is a separate Public Service agency?

Key points

- The Government Sector Employment Act 2013 establishes the Public Service.
- Separate Public Service agencies are part of the Public Service. The head of a separate Public Service agency employs all staff within the agency, including senior executives.
- Relevant provisions: GSE Act Section 22, Part 4 Division 3, and Schedule 1 Part 3.

The Public Service

The Government Sector Employment Act 2013 (GSE Act) establishes the Public Service of New South Wales. Public Service employees are employed in:

- Departments
- Public Service executive agencies related to Departments
- Separate Public Service agencies

Employees of a separate Public Service agency are Public Service employees. The GSE Act, the Government Sector Employment Regulation 2014 (GSE Regulation) and the Government Sector Employment Rules 2014 (GSE Rules) apply to separate agencies.

What is a separate Public Service agency?

Due to the nature of their functions or their statutory independence, separate Public Service

agencies require a greater level of autonomy in their employment arrangements.

The GSE Act includes specific provisions about separate Public Service agencies which are different from the provisions for Public Service executive agencies related to Departments. Three key differences are outlined below.

Agency heads

The heads of separate Public Service agencies are either statutory senior executives or public office holders. This means that their offices are not created by the GSE Act. Most heads of separate Public Service agencies are appointed by the Governor and have some degree of statutory independence in the exercise of their functions.

Statutory senior executives and public office holders are employed under the Act that constitutes their office and have special employment arrangements.





Statutory senior executives have employment arrangements similar to Public Service senior executives. Although they are not appointed under the GSE Act, the Act that constitutes their office will provide for certain employment arrangements under the GSE Act to apply. They are employed in a band, and remunerated in accordance with the Statutory and Other Offices Remuneration Tribunal (SOORT) determination relevant to that band.

Public office holders have special employment arrangements that are defined within the Act that constitutes their office. They are remunerated in accordance with a SOORT determination made specifically for that office and/or appointment.

Employer functions and employment arrangements

The head of a separate Public Service agency carries out the employer functions of the NSW Government in relation to Public Service senior executives and non-executive employees of the separate agency as well as any statutory senior executives employed under the Act that constitutes their office.

Compliance with Public Service Commissioner's directions

The head of a separate Public Service agency is not required to comply with a direction from the Public Service Commissioner (given under section 13 of the GSE Act) if the head of the separate agency considers that the direction is not consistent with the independent exercise of his or her statutory functions, or those of the separate agency.

However, the head of the separate agency is required to report to any Parliamentary Committee that oversees the exercise of those functions on the reasons for non-compliance with the direction (see section 13(4) of the GSE Act).

Assignment to role

To promote mobility and the development of a single and capable Public Service senior executive cohort, a senior executive may be assigned to a role in any Public Service agency in the band in which the senior executive is employed.

The assignment can be by the senior executive's employer or the Public Service Commissioner. However, the Commissioner may only assign a senior executive to a role within a separate Public Service agency with the agreement of the head of that separate agency.

What are the separate Public Service agencies?

Separate Public Service agencies are listed in <u>Schedule 1 Part 3</u> of the GSE Act. There are 14 separate Public Service agencies. See the Appendices for more information.

What is a staff agency?

A number of Public Service agencies listed in Schedule 1 to the GSE Act have 'Staff Agency' in their name. These agencies comprise persons who are employed under the GSE Act in the service of a statutory body that does not have the power to employ staff in its own right.

For example, the Environment Protection Authority Staff Agency comprises persons employed under the GSE Act to enable the Authority to exercise its functions.
